

"Well, chalk up another gray day!" she said.


As Amelia Bedelia waved back, she got an even better idea.

"Chalking up a gray day,"


said Amelia Bedelia.

Amelia Bedelia didn't have one.


So they drew her mom a carpet leading to the best surprise of all.



Then Amelia Bedelia saw their car pulling into the driveway.


Her parents had come home together.

She hugged each of them.


She hugged Amelia Bedelia

Amelia Bedelia's dad took more photographs.


It was a good thing he did.
